Screened passenger traffic at Canadian airports, August 2025

In August 2025, 5.8 million passengers passed through pre-board security screening at checkpoints operated at Canada's eight largest airports, edging down slightly (-0.3%) from August 2024 albeit 5.8% above the pre-COVID-19 pandemic level from August 2019. Historically, the summer months of June, July and August represent the busiest months of the year for the air transportation industry. The summer of 2025 was no exception, with a total of 16.8 million passengers screened at the eight largest airports during this period. This was 2.2% higher than the total for the summer of 2024 and 6.5% higher than the number screened in the same months of 2019, before the pandemic. In August 2025, transborder traffic continued to weaken.

Porter Airlines increases sun destination capacity up to 25% and launches four new winter routes

Porter Airlines is announcing a significant expansion of its 2025-2026 winter schedule, increasing flights to southern destinations by up to 25% during peak travel periods and unveiling four new routes. This includes the introduction of Porter's first-ever transborder service from Vancouver (YVR) with a non-stop flight to Phoenix (PHX). Further enhancing its Ottawa (YOW) base, Porter is adding new routes to two major American Airlines hubs – Phoenix (PHX) and Miami (MIA). This strengthens cross-border connectivity and aligns with the airline's

recently-announced American Airlines codeshare partnership. Growing appetite for AI technology feeds into air cargo demand

Fast-growing demand for cloud infrastructure and the development of huge AI data centers around the world are helping air cargo to offset the loss of e-commerce volume on the trans-Pacific. China-US cross-border e-commerce from January through August 2025 is down 16%, according to data from Sydney-based research consultancy Trade and Transport Group. The US in May 2025 eliminated its "de minimis" exemption for imports valued at under \$800 from China and extended the removal of duty-free access to low-value products to all its trading partners in August 2025.

Air Cargo Resilience Continues: August Demand Up 4.1%

The International Air Transport Association (IATA) released data for August 2025 global air cargo markets showing: 1. Total demand, measured in cargo tonne-kilometers (CTK), rose by 4.1% compared to August 2024 levels (+5.1% for international operations). 2. Capacity, measured in available cargo tonne-kilometers (ACTK), increased by 3.7% compared to August 2024 (+5.5% for international operations).

Willie Walsh, IATA's Director General said "Air cargo demand grew 4.1% in August, marking the sixth consecutive month of year-on-year growth. Volumes continue to grow even as global trade patterns change. Air cargo has benefitted from a shift from sea for some high value goods as shippers try to minimize the risk of tariff changes. And growth patterns indicate some being diverted away from North America, fueling stronger growth for the Europe—Asia, Within Asia, Africa—Asia, and Middle East—Asia trade lanes. This adaptability is vital as shippers navigate the evolving landscape of US tariff policy."

Passenger Demand Grows 4.6% in August

The International Air Transport Association (IATA) released data for August 2025 global passenger demand with the following highlights: 1. *Total demand*, measured in revenue passenger kilometers (RPK), was up 4.6% compared to August 2024. Total capacity, measured in available seat kilometers (ASK), was up 4.5% year-on-year. The August load factor was 86.0% (+0.1 ppt compared to August 2024), a record high for the month. 2. *International demand* rose 6.6% compared to August 2024. Capacity was up 6.5% year-on-year, and the load factor was 85.8% (+0.1 ppt compared to August 2024). 3. *Domestic demand* increased 1.5% compared to August 2024. Capacity was up 1.3% year-on-year. The load factor was 86.3% (+0.1 ppt compared to August 2024).

U.S. Transportation Secretary Sean P. Duffy Deploys Brand New 'Notice to Airmen' System to Provide Critical Alerts About Airspace Changes

U.S. Transportation Secretary Sean P. Duffy on September 30, 2025 announced that the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) has deployed the first phase of a brand-new Notice to Airmen (NOTAM) service months ahead of schedule. The NOTAM service, which provides critical safety alerts about changes in the airspace, was originally built in 1985. It has experienced multiple outages in recent years, including a 2023 nationwide failure under the last administration. This important deployment milestone was achieved on-time and on-budget after Secretary Duffy accelerated the modernization effort.

Two Delta Air Lines Inc. regional jets collided at low speed while taxiing at New York's LaGuardia Airport on Wednesday, October 1, 2025 night, causing minor injuries to one flight attendant and prompting regulators to open an investigation. Both planes were CRJ-900 aircraft operated by Endeavor Air. Endeavor Air Flight 5047 was heading to its gate at the airport when it struck Endeavor Air Flight 5155 around 10 p.m. local time, the U.S. Federal Aviation Administration, which is probing the incident, said in a statement Thursday, October 2, 2025. According to the regulator, air traffic control had instructed flight 5155 to hold short and yield to the other aircraft.

VIA postpones direct Montreal-Toronto pilot

VIA Rail has announced it's postponing a pilot project that would have seen trains travel directly between Montreal and Toronto, skipping several eastern Ontario stops along the way. The plan was for direct service between Canada's two largest cities to begin Sept. 29, 2025 offering riders "downtown-to downtown travel" and shaving 30-40 minutes off some trips. But in a statement on Monday, 29, 2025, VIA said the pilot, which had been criticized by elected officials along the

route, is on hold because of "operational constraints with our rail partner, CN."

■ CPKC pushes back on NS complaint over Meridian track access

Canadian Pacific Kansas City (CPKC) shot down a complaint from Norfolk Southern (NS) that alleged CPKC is throttling access on a jointly owned track in the US Southeast, saying NS' merger partner Union Pacific is ignoring the track's safety protocols on the length of train blocks. CPKC said in a statement to the *Journal of Commerce* that it plans a detailed response to a filing NS made Tuesday, September 30, 2025 with the US Surface Transportation Board (STB) regarding operation of the Meridian Speedway, a 320-mile track between Shreveport, Louisiana. and Meridian, Mississippi.

Investor: CSX can now search out 'willing partner' for rail merger

The activist investor that called for CSX to dump Chief Executive Joe Hinrichs got its way on Monday, September 29, 2025, and said the company is now positioned to find its own rail merger partner. CSX on Monday appointed Linde Chairman Steve Angel to succeed Hinrichs to lead the Jacksonville-based company. Angel guided the former Praxair in its 2018 merger with Linde to form the world's largest industrial gas conglomerate. He's the third executive to come out of retirement recently to lead a railroad, after Hinrichs of Ford and UP's Jim Vena. "With President Donald Trump and other policymakers recently expressing enthusiasm for the benefits of a transcontinental railroad, CSX and other Class I railroads have no choice but to embrace the industry's new realities," Ancora said in the unsigned statement. "Although Steve Angel is not a railroader by trade, his M&A [mergers and acquisitions] pedigree and value creation record indicate his appointment is an initial step in the right direction for CSX.

Inland '25: NS merger won't limit access to other railroads: UP CEO

Shippers will still have easy access to other rail networks should Union Pacific's (UP's) merger with Norfolk Southern (NS) be completed, according to UP CEO Jim Vena. But Vena, speaking Tuesday, September 30, 2025 at the *Journal of Commerce*'s Inland Distribution Conference, said such interline partnerships between railroads fail to deliver the same efficiencies as a merger, citing problems (access limits) that NS is having in a track access agreement with Canadian Pacific Kansas City (CPKC). Vena said he's confident UP can maintain its current high satisfaction with intermodal shippers once its merger with NS is approved.

BNSF to shippers: Speak up about UP-NS merger

BNSF Railway says Union Pacific's proposed acquisition of Norfolk Southern will reduce rail competition, raise rates, curtail service, and likely lead to an operational meltdown. BNSF unveiled a position paper on the UP-NS combination Tuesday, September 30, 2025 while encouraging customers to voice their concerns with the Surface Transportation Board, which will review the proposal to create the first U.S. transcontinental railroad. "No customer is asking for a UP-NS merger to happen. It's driven by Wall Street on the promise of a big shareholder payout," BNSF said. "BNSF does not believe a merger is necessary at this time, when we can deliver immediate benefits to our customers while preserving competition." BNSF contends that shippers will have to cover the cost of the \$85 billion deal because UP's 10% volume growth target is not achievable. As a result, UP will resort to driving up rates on captive traffic and aggressively cutting costs, BNSF said.

U.S. rail traffic rose modestly for the week ending Sept. 27, 2025 and realized a slight gain through 2025's first 39 weeks, vs. the same

points last year, the Association of American Railroads (AAR) reported Oct. 1, 2025. Five of the 10 carload commodity groups posted an increase compared with the same week in 2024. They included nonmetallic minerals, up 2,249 carloads, to 32,825; grain, up 1,710 carloads, to 22,609; and motor vehicles and parts, up 499 carloads, to 17,205. Commodity groups that posted decreases compared with the same week in 2024 included coal, down 1,330 carloads, to 59,499; petroleum and petroleum products, down 439 carloads, to 10,343; and metallic ores and metals, down 355 carloads, to 20,853. Canadian railroads reported 93,860 carloads for the week, down 3.2 percent, and 72,540 intermodal units, up 3.2 percent compared with the same week in 2024. For the first 39 weeks of 2025, Canadian railroads reported cumulative rail traffic volume of 6,307,357 carloads, containers and trailers, up 2.1 percent.

Railinc and Duke University Collaborate on Innovation to Advance Freight Rail Efficiency

Railinc and Duke University are joining forces to connect real-world rail challenges with fresh ideas and student innovation—building tools that improve safety, strengthen workforce readiness, and keep goods moving reliably across America's communities.

Cary, NC — September 25, 2025 — Railinc and Duke University's Christensen Family Center for Innovation (CFCI) today announced a new collaboration to explore practical innovations that advance freight rail safety and efficiency. The initiative will harness Duke's Product Lab, a student-led program where teams co-create solutions in rapid sprints with industry partners to deliver prototypes that have both immediate impact and long-term potential.

This partnership aims to solve a common challenge in the rail industry: billing for railcar repairs.

Railcar repairs are governed by hundreds of conditional rules designed to ensure safe operations. However, the complexity of these rules often results in mechanical teams spending significant time referencing lengthy manuals and correcting paperwork errors.

To address this, Railinc developed CarLogix, an intelligent railcar repair application that guides mechanical staff through the repair recording process. CarLogix checks repair records against hundreds of industry rules in real-time, ensuring accuracy and eliminating rework.

Duke students will explore how applying AI, mobile devices, and social media-style technologies could further improve mechanical team efficiency and knowledge sharing. This is especially critical for teams performing minor repairs outside of traditional repair shops, where access to computers is limited.

Allen West, President and CEO of Railinc, said:

"This collaboration with Duke University is about bringing together innovation, academia, and industry to strengthen the rail network. We are excited to partner with students at Duke on this project and look forward to developing solutions that will improve railcar recording and accuracy – a critical need for the freight rail industry."

Adria Dunbar, Managing Director of the Christensen Family Center for Innovation at Duke University, said:

"At Duke, we believe innovation happens when students, faculty, and industry come together to tackle meaningful, real-world challenges. Collaborating with Railinc brings our mission to life, giving our students the chance to apply their creativity to one of the nation's most vital industries while also creating solutions that strengthen the communities and workers it touches."

Anna Wilson, Executive in Residence at the Christensen Family Center for Innovation, added:

"Product development education should be rooted in apprenticeshipstyle, real-world problem solving. By partnering directly with Railinc, our students gain hands-on experience designing technologies that deliver immediate value—enhancing accuracy, reducing inefficiencies, and helping scale practical tools that rail professionals rely on to run their businesses."

Beyond initial prototypes, the effort is expected to generate lasting benefits: strengthening the rail workforce, improving compliance, and creating new opportunities for students to contribute to the future of a critical national industry.

Port of Vancouver enables record trade in first half of 2025

The Port of Vancouver moved record volumes of Canadian trade in the first six months of 2025, delivering vast quantities of made-in-Canada grain, energy and fertilizer exports to diverse world markets against a challenging geopolitical backdrop. The port's mid-year cargo statistics show a 13% increase in cargo moved between January and June 2025, compared to the same six-month period last year—with a record of more than 85 million metric tons (MMT) of cargo handled. Port of Vancouver terminals handled nearly 20% more international trade than a year ago, as surging exports of Canadian crude, canola oil, grain, potash and coal to markets worldwide. Containerized trade over the first half of 2025 remained steady, while cruise and auto volumes eased following record performances in 2024. "Canadians and their businesses depend on the Port of Vancouver to buy and sell the

products they manufacture, farm, mine and stock their shelves with," said Peter Xotta, President and CEO of the Vancouver Fraser Port Authority.

Montreal joins Vancouver in levying empty container fee

The Port of Montreal has joined Vancouver in imposing a surcharge on empty containers as ocean carriers challenge the justification for the fees with Canadian regulators. The Montreal Port Authority (MPA) imposed a one-time C\$10 fee per empty TEU container starting Tuesday, September 30, 2025 after Vancouver implemented a similar C\$17.58 surcharge on May 1, 2025. The ports have defended the fees, arguing they'll speed up cargo flow at marine terminals and help pay

for infrastructure improvements. The surcharge will help us recover the costs of maintaining infrastructure that empties strain daily. *Montreal joins Vancouver in levying empty container fee, September 30, 2025, www.joc.com*

Federal government denies Marineland request to export belugas

The federal Department of Fisheries and Oceans (DFO) has denied Marineland Canada's request to export its 30 remaining beluga whales to a theme park in China. In a statement, DFO Minister Joanne Thompson said she could not "in good conscience" approve the export and that her decision aligned with regulations in the Fisheries Act to protect marine mammals from exploitation. "To approve the request would have meant a continued life in captivity and a return to public entertainment," Thompson said. "Like many of you, I am angered that these whales have lived a life of captivity and as a result their health has deteriorated," she said. "Canadians expect me to act in the best interest of the whales. Under difficult circumstances with regrettable outcomes, that is what I have done."

Ports brace for government shutdown

Ports, railroads and other logistics providers are waiting and watching ahead of a shutdown of the federal government that could come as soon as midnight Tuesday, September 30,2025. The supply chain could be pressured by any change in operations by Customs and Border Protection. The agency inspects import shipments at maritime centers, airports and land border crossings with Mexico and Canada. Customs in a procedural advisory on Saturday, September 28, 2025 said that passenger processing and cargo inspection at ports of entry will continue during a lapse in appropriations. The advisory noted that of the nearly 68,000 agency employees, more than 63,000 are to be retained to continue some operations during a federal funding hiatus. Port of Savannah container volumes up 9 percent in August

The Port of Savannah handled 534,037 twenty-foot equivalent container units (TEUs) in August, an increase of 44,000 TEUs, or 9 percent year-over-year, representing the third highest month in GPA history. Container volumes were 1,010,725 TEUs fiscal year-to-date

through August, 3.2% higher than last year. In September, Georgia Ports officially started its new fast-track routing process for container vessels entering the Port of Savannah, optimizing the Savannah River transit for inbound vessels to Garden City Terminal. Inbound vessels will temporarily dock at Georgia Ports' Ocean Terminal "lay berth" until a berth at Garden City Terminal opens.

Control of world's port terminals major concern with geopolitics omnipresent

Appearing before a French parliamentary commission recently, Rodolphe Saadé, head of one of the world's leading ocean shipping lines, France's CMA CGM, told MPs that the control of the world's port terminals had become a major concern with geopolitics omnipresent. Regretting that France too often remained a spectator in the clash between major powers, he drew attention to a silent but decisive battle being waged with the active support of the US and China. He said it was essential that France and Europe fully appreciated the scale of this challenge by ensuring strict enforcement of competition rules if the Continent's shipping companies were to continue to have fair access to global markets. While the US has a history of running the rule over foreign port ownership, it has been given fresh impetus under Donald Trump's leadership. In a bid to strengthen national security, his administration has stepped up the targeting of China's growing influence in global ports with the aim of bringing more strategic terminals under Western control. The White House justifies such actions by arguing that the US has become far too dependent on foreign ships and ports which would represent a strategic risk in the event of military conflict.

Busiest U.S. port plans new container terminal for biggest ships

The Port of Los Angeles, already the busiest U.S. import gateway, plans to build a new terminal to accommodate the world's biggest container ships. The Pier 500 project would comprise two berths and 3,000 feet of wharf on 200 acres of land along the Pier 400 channel, on the southern end of Terminal Island. Los Angeles, with neighboring Port of Long Beach, form the busiest U.S. container gateway, handling 10.3 million and 9.6 million twenty foot equivalent units (TEUs), respectively, in 2024. Los Angeles is seeking proposals for a predevelopment agreement covering the project's financial feasibility and other requirements.

Thunder Bay, Ont., enforces new truck route Oct. 1

Thunder Bay's new designated truck route (DTR) bylaw takes effect Oct. 1, 2025 redirecting most heavy trucks to the Trans-Canada Highway (Highway 11/17) instead of Dawson Road or Arthur Street. Exceptions apply for local deliveries. "Redirecting heavy truck traffic to Highway 11/17 is a strategic move that prioritizes the safety of our residents while preserving the integrity of our local roads," Kayla Dixon, commissioner of infrastructure and operations said in a news release. An engineering assessment completed in 2024 validated earlier traffic findings, and city council subsequently approved the bylaw. The DTR is intended to improve public safety by reducing truck-related risks, shift traffic to the highway, and still allow local deliveries to support businesses.

Canadian postal workers protested against government measures to overhaul the national postal service on Wednesday, October 1, 2025 nearly a week into a strike that has stopped mail delivery. Just over 100 Canada Post employees gathered in downtown Toronto as part of a National Day of Action organized by the Canadian Union of Postal Workers (CUPW). The union is trying to negotiate a new contract and opposes proposed government budget cuts that include ending doorto-door delivery and closing some rural post offices. Protesters said the changes are unfair to workers and to Canadians who rely on the system. "We're getting the shaft from both our corporation and the government," said Graham Bulmer, a Canada Post employee of nearly 10 years. "They want to dismantle an institution that's been the backbone of Canada for over 100 years. We can't let them do that." Government-owned Canada Post faces deep financial trouble and officials say the cost cutting steps are necessary. "The Postal Service is an essential service. We need a viable Postal Service. Currently the situation is difficult," Prime Minister Mark Carney said on Wednesday. "Canada Post is losing millions of dollars. We need to take action. We need to restructure... It has been some time that we've needed to have changes at Canada Post."

Trump's Transportation Secretary Sean P. Duffy Takes Emergency Action to Protect America's Roads, Restrict Non-Domiciled CDLs

On September 26, 2025, U.S. Transportation Secretary Sean P. Duffy announced an emergency action to drastically restrict who is eliqible

for a non-domiciled commercial learner's permits (CLPs) and commercial driver's licenses (CDLs). The rule, effective immediately, comes in response to an ongoing nationwide audit by the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) and a recent series of horrific, fatal crashes caused by non-domiciled drivers. The audit has uncovered both a catastrophic pattern of states issuing licenses illegally to foreign drivers, as well as the fact that even if the current regulatory framework is followed, it can fail. The confluence of these two factors has created an imminent hazard on America's roadways that must be fixed.

Transborder Trends: the Weight of Freight

The Bureau of Transportation Statistics TransBorder freight data program measures the value of freight flows by mode of transportation with Canada and Mexico by month and year. A recent analysis of this data indicates a notable deviation in the dollar value of imports and exports carried by truck across US borders as well as the weight of imports carried by truck. Specifically, HS chapter 84 includes machinery and mechanical equipment used in the automotive industry such as parts for engines and transmissions. Chapter 85 covers computer components and electrical parts such as the onboard computer, infotainment system, and navigation. This data spotlight highlights an accelerating discrepancy in the dollar value and weight of U.S. truck freight with Canada and Mexico, specifically for goods classified under HS chapters 84 - 85. Since 2008, and particularly since 2021, the proportional relationship between the dollar value and weight of these shipments has changed.

Trump slaps 25% tariff on complete trucks

U.S. President Donald Trump took to social media last night to announce 25% tariffs on heavy trucks not built in the U.S. "In order to protect our Great Heavy Truck Manufacturers from unfair outside competition, I will be imposing, as of October 1st, 2025, a 25% Tariff on all "Heavy (Big!) Trucks" made in other parts of the World," he posted on his Truth Social platform. "Therefore, our Great Large Truck Company Manufacturers, such as Peterbilt, Kenworth, Freightliner, Mack Trucks, and others, will be protected from the onslaught of outside interruptions. We need our Truckers to be financially healthy and strong, for many reasons, but above all else, for National Security purposes!" He appeared to use national security as a reason to bypass USMCA requirements. Both Mack Trucks and Volvo have recently said publicly they feel disadvantaged by the current tariff policy, which requires them to pay tariffs on components produced outside the U.S. while complete trucks built in Mexico are free from tariffs under the US-Mexico-Canada trade deal. Volvo president Peter Voorhoeve explained the situation in an exclusive interview with trucknews.com earlier this week. Paccar, parent to Peterbilt and Kenworth, also builds most of its trucks in the U.S. Its shares were up 6% pre-market on the news.

FedEx, UPS peak season surcharges could drive shippers to competitors





Peak season surcharges by major parcel carriers have been routine for more than a decade, but in a year when demand growth is forecast to be muted critics are questioning the fees' rationale and warning they will cause a further exodus of e-commerce shippers to alternative delivery companies. Average daily volume for the busy holiday shopping season is expected to increase by low double-digits from earlier this year, compared to a nearly 100% increase in 2013 and a 50% surge during the 2020 pandemic, according to new research by ShipMatrix, a consulting and technology firm that helps businesses manage their parcel spending. Peak volume has been essentially flat year over year since 2021. ShipMatrix estimates that 2.3 billion packages will be delivered in the United States during the peak season, 5% higher than the same period of 2024, mostly because of an extra shopping day this year.

The <u>Bureau of Transportation Statistics</u> (BTS) released the annual update of bikeshare and electric scooter (e-scooter) system data. The dataset includes cities with a bikeshare (docked or dockless) and/or e-scooter system in operation as of June 30th in each year from 2015 to 2025. As of June 30, 2025, 72 docked bikeshare systems open to the public operated 9,624 docking stations in the U.S. One docked bikeshare system closed in August 2025 bringing the number of docked bikeshare systems down to 71 and the total number of stations to 9,594. Excluding the system that closed in August 2025, on average, each system operated 135 docking stations. The largest system (Citi Bike serving New York City, NY; Jersey City, NJ; and Hoboken, NJ) operated just over 2,200 stations, and 21 systems had 10 or fewer stations.

U.S. tightens CDL regulations for non-citizens

The U.S. Department of Transportation has issued an emergency <u>final rule</u> that restricts the ability of non-citizens to obtain a commercial driver's licence (CDL), potentially resulting in the removal of up to 194,000 drivers from U.S. highways. "Today's actions will prevent unsafe foreign drivers from renewing their licence and hold states accountable to immediately invalidate improperly issued licences," DOT Secretary Sean Duffy said. Duffy said during a Sept. 26 press conference that the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) has identified at least five fatal crashes involving non-domiciled CDL holders so far in 2025. That includes the high-profile fatal crash in Florida blamed on a truck driver licensed in California and believed to have been in the United States illegally. The new rule only allows noncitizen drivers with H-2a, H-2b or E-2 visas to receive

CDL. It also calls for applicants to appear in person for each renewal and mandates additional steps States must take when issuing these credentials. "The current regulatory framework does not provide a sufficient margin of safety to protect the traveling public," according to the text of the rule.

Tourism gross domestic product (GDP), in real terms, grew 1.3% in the second quarter of 2025, compared with a 0.3% increase in the first quarter as Canadians are travelling to the United States less and spending their tourism dollars in Canada. In the second quarter, tourism GDP accounted for 1.77% of nominal GDP, compared with 1.75% in the previous quarter and jobs attributable to tourism increased 0.6%.

Ottawa needs to give Canada's competition watchdog greater powers so that it can lead the battle to break down protectionist inter-provincial trade barriers, a leading authority on the subject said Wednesday at a competition policy event. Boswell has in recent months been calling for a 'whole-of-government' approach to boosting domestic trade. Ryan Manucha, a research fellow at the C.D. Howe Institute think tank and the author of an award-winning book on inter-provincial free trade, said Canada's Competition Bureau should be given new "soft power" to lead efforts to get provinces and territories to a "mutual recognition" of a host of rules and regulations.


